Clarity is Kindness

Most Christians agree that church unity is important. One need only consider Jesus' prayer "that [my disciples] may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me" (John 17:21, ESV). He goes on to pray for unity among disciples in the same way that he and his Father are one "so that the world may know that you sent me and loved them even as you loved me" (17:23). Lack of unity in the Body of Christ threatens the church's witness to the world.

Achieving church unity is even more challenging due to three differing perspectives of what it means to be unified in Christ. The first perspective involves refusing to interact with anyone who does not agree on every point. This approach is often seen in conservative circles and prioritizes faithfulness to truth over preservation of relationships. This perspective eliminates unity by deepening isolation of each group.



A more common approach prioritizes relationships over truth. Best seen in early ecumenical movements and the focus on areas of agreement (and minimizing differences). While helpful in initial conversations, this approach is ultimately unable to resolve the root causes of conflict. By not addressing disagreements directly, leaders and organizations appear untrustworthy or deceptive to those unwilling to sacrifice truth-claims for relationship. Minimizing contested convictions may protect institutional unity, but it comes at the price of increased anxiety and confusion. Those who decide to leave an institution are also often cut off from ongoing efforts of unity because of their disloyalty to the institution, similar to the aforementioned approach.

A third way recognizes both faithfulness to the truth and pursuit of relational connection. Rather than placing faith in human efforts to short-cut or avoid conflict resulting from competing convictions, we seek a unity of the Spirit (Eph. 4:3). Christian unity is discovered through relating to each other, serving Jesus in community, and bearing witness of God's will to each other and the world.

This third approach also recognizes that "we see in a mirror dimly" (1 Cor. 13:12) and our broken humanity prevents a full understanding of God's will. We must

always admit we have more to learn and be slow to cut off contact with those with whom we disagree. And, we cannot treat our convictions as arbitrary or unsure. To paraphrase Martin Luther, our consciences are captive to God's Word and we cannot act otherwise. To do so is to risk becoming like "children, tossed to and fro by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes" (Eph. 4:14).

As we pursue unity of Spirit, Evana Network works with those who share common goals and mutual calling.

This is a relational commitment to work with others while maintaining a commitment to God's truth as we understand it and not compromising convictions. Our personal and congregational covenants provide clarity on where we are headed and what is expected from Evana and leaders. Our covenants reflect a commitment to truth claims manifested in relationship to God and one another.

As we celebrate Christ's birth, and the Creator's incredible gift of redemption, we also await the gift of unity in Jesus' own body, the church. We actively prepare ourselves and seek unity wherever it may be found, while receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit, which brings the conviction and the repentance necessary for spiritual maturity and full knowledge of Jesus.


Providing clarity about what one believes and practices is a kindness by reducing passive aggressive behavior, political posturing, and attempts to manipulate others into affirming teaching and practices that go against convictions. We need courage to have tough conversations and be honest with one another about differences. Only then are we able to make progress in working toward unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

"And I will make them and the places around my hill a blessing, and I will send down the showers in their season; they shall be showers of blessing." Ezekiel 34:26


